

## The Burning of the Palms Sunday, March 2 at 4:00pm

Have you ever wondered where the ashes for Ash Wednesday come from? Every year, after the Palm Sunday service, the palms are collected and dried. The Sunday before Ash Wednesday (March 2 this year) we each take a dried palm and burn it. The burnt palms are ground into the ashes that are put upon our foreheads in the shape of a cross on Ash Wednesday. This is a very tangible experience for all ages.

Here at Park, we go to the Paul and Beth Kelly's scenic back yard and gather around the fire pit. Darryl leads us in short explanation and liturgy. Then we each take our palm and burn it. Dave Kutsche, along with help from the kids, stirs the burnt palms until they are ash then we enjoy roasting hotdogs and fellowshiping with each other. This is a perfect "pre-lent" activity that adds meaning to lent....and is fun!

In a sure sign that winter cannot last forever, the Park Church Women invite you to support the annual Spring Thank Offering. Park's Justice in Action committee is encouraging Park members and friends to read and comment on the City of Grand Rapids Climate Action and Adaptation Plan (CAAP). The CAAP will act as a roadmap for how the community of Grand Rapids will reduce greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) and prepare for the impacts of climate change on its residents, environment, and infrastructure. The CAAP is being co-created in partnership with community stakeholders to meet community-wide science-based targets. Members of Park have been involved in the process of creating the Plan. The CAAP targets are:

- 1. 62.8% per capita GHG reduction community-wide by 2030 from 2019 emissions
- 2. 100% per capita GHG reduction by 2050 from 2019 emissions
